Dear Kathy,

The MAD Oversight Committee is requesting that the following procedure be considered and implemented.

In addition to submitting individual proposals to the Committee for review and recommendation, we believe an overall spending plan needs to be created which indicates spending amounts by category and by zone.

Individual proposals would cite the category and cumulative total of obligations within that category.

The purpose of this would be to not overspend in the two zones, and in the categories. This would help keep spending within the constraints of the Engineers Report.

Members of the Finance sub committee are available to work together with CDC staff to achieve this.

These recommendations were gathered by staff in the process of inspecting successful MAD's, responding to property owner requests, and talking with City staff. In order of priority, our recommendations include; 1.Sidewalk Repair Program 2.Parkways and Tree Wells

3.Beautification

4. Trail around Golf Course

5.Golf Cart

6.Logo

Staff has received several requests from property owners to repair broken sidewalks and curbs, and a visual inspection of the district shows that there are thousands of square feet of broken sidewalks and crumbling curbs that present safety hazards as well as an appearance of neglect.

<u>City Responsibility:</u> The Streets Division of the City of San Diego is required to fix sidewalk problems caused by vehicle accidents, water main breaks, damage caused by City tree roots, and natural subsidence. <u>The City offers a 50/50 cost sharing program</u>: Property owners are responsible for the repair or replacement of their sidewalk in cases of deterioration due to old age, privately owned tree roots, heavy vehicle traffic or drainage from private property. However, the City will split the cost with the property owner as part of the 50/50 Cost Sharing Program. Currently there is a wait list of over a year for repairs to be made using this program, and City staff anticipates a significant increase in the backlog and wait time due to current budget cuts.

The City often repairs damaged sidewalks with asphalt rather than repouring concrete, which as you see in these photos is not only unattractive but also not a long term solution. The asphalt begins to crumble away with wear and tear from foot traffic. The examples below were repaired last year.

In talking with Luis Ojeda, the staff created the following recommendation:

1. Identify broken sidewalks and curbs in the neighborhood

2.Photograph the problems and measure the total square footage

3. Submit repair request to the Street Division and Urban Forestry

4.Get cost estimate and survey from the City

5.If and when the relevant departments determine that they are unable to make the requisite repairs, prepare an RFP for sidewalk repair

In the College Heights MAD, a district much smaller than our own, a similar process was carried out that will result in the MAD funding \$230,000 + for sidewalk repair. Our own costs, based on the College Heights example, will likely run over \$350,000 due to the larger area and older sidewalks. Staff requests that \$350,000 be set aside to pursue this project, which represents a significant portion of the rollover funds from last fiscal year. The bulk of the funds will be expended in Zone 2, as is required by our Engineer's Report. If the City is able to make the repairs or can plan realistically to do so within a reasonable time, funds can be used for an alternate project.

Parkways and tree wells.

Staff, together with the Executive Committee, recommends that a universal design be incorporated in all the parkways and tree wells in the District. The design should feature the following;

1.Low cost materials

2.Low water/low maintenance plant choices

3. Aesthetically pleasing appearance in keeping with the neighborhood

We suggest the use of river rock, which is not only cheap and abundant but also in keeping with the Craftsman style of much of the neighborhood, and low water plants be used. Tree grates have been suggested, and may be appropriate in some areas, but due to the age of most of our trees their roots have already grown higher than the level of the sidewalk which would make installation impossible. They also come with a high cost of approximately \$1,000 each. We believe that existing tree grates should be installed where appropriate, but recommend against purchasing more.

City Responsibility: In cases where weeds in the parkway interfere with traffic the City will treat it as brush management and cut back the weeds.

Beautifacation.

Staff has compiled the following recommendations by surveying successful MAD's in the City of San Diego and consulting with community members who have requested improvements such as enhanced landscaping and installation of street furniture.

City Responsibility: The City of San Diego has no responsibility to provide beautification efforts within our community. City staff has advised that beautification and installation of street furniture are more appropriately done by a MAD as it is an improvement and provides a special benefit to ratepayers.

Staff Recommends the following beautification efforts;

1.Installation of street furniture to include sidewalk planters, hanging baskets, and tables and chairs 2.Low water flowers and shrubs for planters and hanging baskets

Golf Course trail.

There is no safe walking trail on Golf Course Drive though it is used heavily by joggers, bikers, and pedestrians. Staff recommends pursuing the construction of a safe walking trail, provided that the project can be accomplished for a reasonable sum. Important issues include whether or not the trail would be required to be ADA compliant.

Golf Cart.

Purchasing a Golf Cart would be beneficial due to the expense of monthly mileage reimbursements. Last month the MAD had to pay \$125 for local community trips. The cost of mileage reimbursement will only continue to increase as more services begin to be provided. Currently Rosemary Downing does not submit mileage reimbursements for MAD related trips as she considers it a donation. Cost: The Price for a used Golf Cart will range from \$2500-\$6000. The Price will vary depending if the cart is street legal. Staff recommends purchasing a cart that is already street legal. Staff will first attempt to receive a golf cart through donation. Insurance costs will be approximately \$100 per year.
